Asylum for Boys.

A PERIOD of nearly ten years having elapsed since the establishment of the Boston Asylum for Indigent Boys, the Managers have thought that a short history of the foundation of this Institution, and some account of its progress and present situation, would be interesting to the subscribers and the public.

The objects of this charity, it is well known, are to afford a shelter and support to the children of the virtuous poor; and to protect from the influence of bad example the young, who are doubly unfortunate, in being early exposed not only to the evils of poverty, but to scenes of depravity and vice; to instruct them in the elements of education, and to give them those early habits of industry and piety which will prepare them for usefulness and respectability in mature years.

Several gentlemen, who had witnessed the salutary operation of that valuable institution, the Female Asylum, apprehending that a similar establishment for boys, would be equally useful in a community like ours, and that its effects would be even more important, as the influence of the character of one sex must always be more extensive than that of the other, associated for these charitable purposes in the winter of 1813.

An Act of Incorporation was granted by the Legislature in February, 1814, and the society was shortly afterwards organized by the choice of officers and the establishment of By-Laws and Regulations.

To the gentlemen who first assisted in the foundation, and who first directed the affairs of this institution, and particularly to its first President, and one of its most active friends and supporters, the late Benjamin Greene Esq. must be ascribed much of the success and usefulness of this charity, and the result of their efforts, aided by the patronage of the community, has been highly valuable.

The society has received into the Asylum House since its organization no less than seventy-four destitute children. Of these, thirty-six have been bound out apprentices to reputable farmers and tradesmen, agreeably to the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, two have died, and one, upon the application of his father, been given up to him. Thirty-five yet remain at the Asylum, most of them too young to be removed at present from it.

The number of applications for admission since the establishment of this Institution is two hundred and twenty-one. Some of these have been rejected by the Managers as improper cases for this charity, but many others they are obliged to neglect by the limited extent of the means of the Institution, and there is reason to apprehend that these are not increasing with the calls for their application.—The resources of the Asylum have heretofore been principally dependent upon the contributions of Annual Subscribers and of these there was at one time

eight hundred and sixty. At present the number does not exceed six hundred and from various causes the list is every year lessening. The funds which have been derived from donations and legacies have been applied to the purchase of the estate occupied as the Asylum House, and the remainder has been invested in Stocks of different kinds as will appear by the subjoined statement. But the income of the Institution it must be apparent, is very inadequate to any considerable degree of usefulness.

The number of children received into the Asylum must either be very limited or the nurture and education of those admitted, cannot be so carefully attended to, as is desirable. The Asylum House affords accommodation for a much larger number of children than its present occupants, and no expenses, but those of food and clothing, would be increased by adding to the number of beneficiaries. The Managers feel confident that it is unnecessary to urge the importance of this Institution. No one, who has examined its claims, can be insensible to them, for it is impossible there should be any difference of opinion as to the salutary effect of an Institution, the principal object of which is to subject to early moral discipline the young, who might otherwise be exposed to the most corrupt examples.

The Act of Incorporation and the Bye-Laws of the Society, which follow, will furnish some further information as to its purposes and the mode of conducting its affairs.

Act of Incorporation.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

An Act to incorporate the Boston Asylum for Indigent Boys.

WHEREAS William Phillips, James Lloyd, William Sullivan, Benjamin Greene, and Samuel H. Walley, and a number of other persons, have associated for the charitable purpose of relieving, instructing and employing indigent boys belonging to the town of Boston, and to carry their association into effect, have petitioned to be incorporated.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same,* That the said William Phillips and his associates, together with such others as may become subscribers to the same Institution in the manner herein after provided, be, and they are hereby incorporated into a Society, by the name of the "BOSTON ASYLUM FOR INDIGENT BOYS," and by that name shall be a corporation for ever, with power to have a common seal; to make contracts relative to the objects of their Institution; to sue and be sued; to establish by-laws and orders for the regulation of the said Society, and the preservation and application of the funds thereof, provided the same be not repugnant to the constitution or laws of this commonwealth; to take, hold, and possess any estate, real or

personal, by subscription, gift, grant, purchase, devise, or otherwise, free from taxes, and the same to improve, lease, exchange, or sell and convey, for the sole benefit of said Institution; provided that the value of the real estate of said Society shall never, at any one time, exceed fifty thousand dollars, and the annual income of the whole estate of said society shall not exceed twenty thousand dollars.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That every person, who shall subscribe and pay to the funds of said Society a sum not less than three dollars annually, shall by such subscription and payment become a Member of said Society, liable however to be removed therefrom on neglect or refusal to pay the annual subscription aforesaid.

SECT. 3. *Be it further enacted,* That the said Society shall meet in Boston on the first Monday in May annually, for the purpose of electing by ballot from their members, a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Board of not less than six, nor more than nine Managers, in addition to the President, Vice President, and Treasurer of the Society, who shall always be *ex officio* members of the Board of Managers, all which officers shall hold their respective offices one year, and until others shall be elected to succeed them, except in case of vacancy by death or resignation, in which case the Board of Managers shall have power to fill such vacancy until the ensuing annual election. And the said Board of Managers shall have power to call a meeting of the said Society, whenever they may deem it expedient; and it shall be their duty to call such meeting whenever requested

thereto by fifty of the subscribers; and to give notice of the annual meetings by advertisements in at least two of the newspapers printed in Boston, at least seven days before such meeting. Not less than three Managers shall form a quorum for the transaction of business; and all questions shall be decided by the votes of a majority of the Managers present; and at all meetings of the Society, or the Managers, the President shall preside, or if absent, the Vice President; and in case of the absence of both of the said officers, such person shall preside as the Society, or the Board of Managers, at their respective meetings, may elect.

SECT. 4. *Be it further enacted,* That the Treasurer of the Society shall give bonds for the faithful performance of the duties of his office, and to render accounts of his transactions therein, as often as may be required by the Board of Managers, in such sum, and with such sureties, as to the Board of Managers may be acceptable. And any officer or member of the said Society may be removed therefrom, on the vote of a majority of the whole number of the members of which the Society may at the time consist.

SECT. 5. *Be it further enacted,* That the Board of Managers, for the time being, shall have the entire direction and control of the concerns, business, and interests of the Society, and shall have the management and application of all the subscriptions, donations, funds, and estate of the Society, to be appropriated solely for the uses of the Society; and no sale or transfer of any real or personal estate of said society shall be valid, unless approved by them; and no money shall be paid out of the treasury, except by their or-

der. They shall likewise have authority, at their discretion, to take into their Asylum such indigent boys, belonging to the town of Boston, as they may judge to be suitable objects of charity, to enjoy the benefits of the Institution; and also to accept a surrender, in writing by the father, or where there is no father, by the mother or guardian of any indigent boy as aforesaid, to the care and direction of said Society, and to bind out in virtuous families, or to reputable trades or occupations, or to educate in such manner as they may deem beneficial, until the age of twenty-one years, any such indigent boy, or boys, thus surrendered, or any such boy, who being destitute of parents, within this Commonwealth, shall have been relieved and supported by the Society; provided that any parent whose child or children shall have received relief, or have been bound out as aforesaid; during the absence of such parent from this state, shall have liberty on his or her return to the state, to receive and withdraw such child or children, on paying to the Treasurer of the Society, the expense incurred in his or their relief and support as aforesaid. And the Managers shall have authority to establish any rules and regulations for the proceedings of the Board, and the concerns of said Society, not repugnant to the laws of this Commonwealth, or the by-laws of said Society.

SECT. 6. *Be it further enacted,* That any writ or process against said Corporation may be served by the officer's leaving an attested copy thereof with the Treasurer of said Society, or at his last or usual place of residence, thirty days before the return day thereof; and the said Treasurer, or any person appointed for

that purpose by the Society, or by the Managers, may appear by Attorney, and defend or prosecute any suit in behalf of said Society. And all instruments of conveyance or contract which may lawfully be made by said Society, shall be approved by the Managers, and signed by the President or Vice President, as the Board may direct, and countersigned by the Secretary, and, if necessary, sealed with the common seal of said Society, and, when so executed, shall be binding thereon, and valid in law.

SECT. 7. Be it further enacted, That Benjamin Greene be, and he is hereby authorized to call the first meeting of the said Society, by giving public notice of the time and place of meeting, by advertisement in one or more of the newspapers printed in the town of Boston, at least three days prior to each meeting; and at which meeting, the officers before mentioned of the Society shall be elected, and shall hold their offices until the first annual election of officers shall be holden agreeably to the provisions of this Act.

Bye-Laws.

1. Every person who shall contribute one hundred dollars, shall be considered a member for life, of the first class; every person who shall contribute fifty dollars and upwards, and less than one hundred dollars, shall be considered a member for life of the second class; and such subscriptions shall be added to the permanent fund.

2. Every person who shall subscribe and pay three dollars annually, shall be considered a member during pleasure.

3. The amount of all donations and bequests, (except otherwise prescribed by the donor or testator,) and of all collections, except the annual subscriptions, shall constitute a permanent fund, and be invested in such manner, as the Board of Managers shall direct, and the income only of the permanent fund shall be expended for the purposes of the charity.

4. A meeting of the Board of Managers shall be held the second Monday of every month, at the Asylum House, for the purpose of attending to the concerns of the Society; and any three of their number shall be competent to the transaction of all business, except the admission and discharge of boys; the meeting shall be held at such hour as shall be determined on by the Managers.

5. The President shall preside at all meetings of

the Society and Board of Managers, which he shall attend; in his absence the Vice President; if neither be present, the Society or Board of Managers, as the case may be, may elect a chairman. At all meetings the presiding officer, in case of an equal division, shall have the casting vote.

6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to notify and attend all meetings of the Society, and of the Board of Managers, to keep a correct and fair record of their proceedings, and to do all necessary writing relative to the business of the corporation. The Secretary shall also place in the Managers' room at the Asylum House, the name and place of residence of the Monthly Committee, to the end that all persons may know to whom to apply for the admission or removal of a child; he shall also record in a book kept for that purpose all applications for admission into the Asylum, which (except in special cases) shall have priority of claim according to their date.

7. The Treasurer shall attend the meetings of the Board of Managers, and shall render once in every three months an account of moneys received, paid out, and remaining in his hands.

8. In the event of a vacancy in the Board of Managers, a nomination list shall be opened for one month and the Secretary previous to the election of the Manager or Managers to fill such vacancy, shall insert in his notification to the Board, information that a choice is to be made.

9. There shall be a Committee of one taken from the Board of Managers, for each and every month, to

serve in rotation, whose duty it shall be to examine into the circumstances of boys offered for admission into the Asylum, and also to make inquiries concerning those persons applying to take boys out of the Asylum, to call special intermediate meetings of the Managers, and generally to oversee the concerns of the Institution.

10. There shall be a Master or Matron of the Asylum, to be appointed by the Board of Managers, and removable by them, to whom shall be entrusted the more immediate management and superintendance of the boys. It shall be the duty of the Master or Matron, to remain constantly at the Asylum, and in no case to be absent, especially during the night, without permission from the Monthly Committee; nor shall the Master or Matron allow any boy to be absent at any time from the Asylum, without special permission in writing from one of the Managers.

11. The boys shall be received into the Asylum from three to twelve years of age, and be allowed to remain there till disposed of, as authorised by the Act of Incorporation. Boys born in the city of Boston will be preferred. The boys shall be taught to read, write and cipher, and shall be employed in some useful occupation.

12. Every parent, guardian, or other person, surrendering a boy to the Society, shall, previously to the admission of such boy into the Asylum, give an obligation not to interfere in the management of the child, and not to visit him without the consent of a Manager, nor ask or receive any compensation for his

services, nor induce, or attempt to induce any child to leave the family or station in which he may be placed by the Managers.

13. No relative or acquaintance of any child belonging to the Asylum, shall interfere in the management of such child, or be permitted to visit him, except in presence of the Master or Matron, nor shall more than two of the same family visit any child at one time, nor for a longer time than half an hour, except in case of sickness.

14. No boy shall be received into or dismissed from the Asylum, or apprenticed out, except by a majority of the Board of Managers; nor shall any boy be admitted into the Asylum before his surrender shall have been made to the Society, and the parent or guardian shall have obliged him or herself to receive the child, if, after a trial of three months, the Board of Managers shall choose to return him. In placing out the boys, subscribers are to have the preference.

15. Every member shall pay the annual subscription on the first Monday of May, that being the anniversary of the election of officers; and any Subscriber intending to withdraw from the Society shall give notice of such intention to the Secretary in writing by the 15th of April, otherwise he shall be held to pay the annual subscription for the next year.

 sive care, management, and direction of the said So-
 ciety and the Board of Managers thereof, until the
 day of _____ which will be in the
 year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and
 _____ when the said _____ will arrive at
 the age of twenty-one years; to be fed, clothed, gov-
 erned, corrected, instructed, and employed, according
 to the regulations of said Institution, and under the
 direction of the proper officers thereof; and when
 they shall think fit and proper, by them to be bound
 out in a virtuous family, or to a reputable trade or
 occupation; or to be educated in such other manner
 as they may deem beneficial during said term of mi-
 nority; hereby giving, granting, and transferring unto
 them, all my right, power, and authority in and over
 him the said minor.

And I do hereby covenant, That I will in no way or manner, either directly or indirectly, interfere with the management, direction, or government of the said minor; that I will never visit, nor attempt to visit him, except as may from time to time be permitted me under the regulations of said Institution; that I will never ask nor receive any compensation for his services; nor induce, nor attempt to induce him to leave any family, station, or employment, in which he may be placed by the Board of Managers; and, finally, that I will strictly conform to all the rules, regulations, and requirements of the said BOSTON ASYLUM FOR INDIGENT BOYS.

Form of an Indenture.

THIS INDENTURE, of two parts, made and executed this day of in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty by and between the BOSTON ASYLUM FOR INDIGENT BOYS, of the first part; and of in the county of and state of of the other part, WITNESSETH :

That the said BOSTON ASYLUM FOR INDIGENT BOYS, by virtue of the authority given by the act incorporating the said Society, and under the provisions and res-

trictions in the said Act contained, do, by these presents, place and bind out _____ a minor, who has been relieved, supported, and instructed by the said Institution, to the said _____ to learn the art, trade, and mystery of _____ and with him, after the manner of an apprentice, to dwell and serve, from the day of the ensealing hereof until the day of _____ which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and _____ when the said minor will arrive at the age of twenty one years.

And the said _____ does hereby covenant and agree with the said BOSTON ASYLUM FOR INDIGENT Boys, that he will cause the said minor to be suitably instructed in the art, trade, and mystery of _____ that he will also cause the said minor to be suitably instructed in reading, writing, arithmetic, and in Christian morals and religion, and will train him up in habits of industry, sobriety, and virtue; that he will provide and allow the said minor, during the said term, wholesome and sufficient meat, drink, lodging, clothing, and all other things, in health and sickness, necessary and suitable for his situation and employment; and at the expiration of said term will give to said minor two suits of clothes, complete, and suitable to his degree and standing in life.

Provided, however, that in case of the death of the said _____ within said period, or if he shall not well and faithfully keep and perform each and all the covenants aforesaid on his part to be performed, then it shall be lawful for the Board of Managers of the said Asylum, for the time being, if they shall think proper,

to take away the said minor from the said and to bind him out to any other person for the residue of the said term, any thing in this indenture to the contrary notwithstanding.

Regulations.

1. The children, if the weather permit, shall regularly attend public worship, with the Master or Matron every Sunday, at such place as the Board of Managers shall direct; and it shall be the duty of the Master or Matron to attend particularly on that day to the religious instruction of the children.

2. The Master or Matron shall read a portion of Scripture, and pray with the children morning and evening; and shall attend them at their meals and say grace. They shall also endeavor by precept and example, to instill into the minds of the children the principles of religion, and to form them to habits of piety and virtue.

3. It shall be the duty of the Master or Matron to instruct the children in spelling, reading, knitting and spinning, or such other occupations as in the opinion of the Board, may best suit their respective ages and capacities.

4. The Master or Matron shall not permit any boy to be taken from the Asylum until the person applying shall have provided proper clothes for him, in lieu of those belonging to the Society, which shall in all cases be retained.

5. The Monthly Committee shall regulate the bill of fare, and a sample of the food shall be produced to them whenever required.

6. In case of sickness, the Master or Matron shall observe such directions, as may from time to time be given by the Monthly Committee.

7. From the first of April to the first of October, the boys shall rise at 6 o'clock in the morning, say their prayers, wash themselves, comb their hair, and clean their chambers; the Master or Matron shall then read a portion of Scripture and pray with them; they shall breakfast at 8 o'clock, play until 9 o'clock, attend school until 12, and from 12 to 1 be employed as the Monthly Committee may direct, dine at 1, play until 2, attend school until prayers at 5, after which play one hour; sup at half past 6; in the evening wash; wash their feet three times a week, and on Saturday night wash all over; say their prayers and go to bed at 8 o'clock.

8. From the first of October to the first of April, the same general regulations to be observed, excepting that the boys shall rise at 7 o'clock, breakfast at half

past 8, sup at 6, go to bed at 7, wash their feet twice a week, and omit washing all over.
